this book argues that ethnic and racial tension brought on by the fighting in the borderland made anglo texans feel justified in their violent actions against mexicans

on january 20 1942 black oil mill worker cleo wright assaulted a white woman in her home and nearly killed the first police officer who tried to arrest him an angry mob then hauled wright out of jail and dragged him through the streets of sikeston missouri before burning him alive wright s death was unfortunately not unique in american history but what his death meant in the larger context of life in the united states in the twentieth century is an important and compelling story after the lynching the u s justice department was forced to become involved in civil rights concerns for the first time provoking a national reaction to violence on the home front at a time when the country was battling for democracy in europe dominic capuci unravels the tragic story of wright s life on several stages showing how these acts of violence were indicative not only of racial tension but the clash of the traditional and the modern brought about by the war capuci draws from a wide range of archival sources and personal interviews with the participants and spectators to draw vivid portraits of wright his victims law enforcement officials and members of the lynch mob he places wright in the larger context of southern racial violence and shows the significance of his death in local state and national history during the most important crisis of the twentieth century

frazier b baker a married 40 year old african american schoolteacher and the father of six children was appointed postmaster of lake city south carolina in 1897 under william mckinley the 25th president of the united states local whites objected and had undertaken a campaign to force his removal when these efforts failed to dislodge baker a mob attacked him and his family at night at their house which also served as the post office baker and his infant daughter julia baker died at his house after being fatally shot during a white mob attack on february 22 1898 the mob set the house on fire to force the family out his wife and two of his other five children were wounded but escaped the burning house and mob and survived on december 10 2018 u s representative james clyburn d s c introduced a bill to rename the lake city post office after baker saying it would ensure that his story won t be forgotten the state s entire congressional delegation co sponsored the bill and president donald trump signed it into law december 21 2018

on august 28 1955 14 year old emmett till was abducted from his great uncle s cabin in mississippi and killed with a collection of more than 100 documents metress retells till s story in a unique and daring way juxtaposing news accounts and investigative journalism with memoirs poetry and fiction

between 1850 and 1950 at least 115 women were lynched by mobs in the united states the majority of these women were black this book examines the phenomenon of the lynching of women a much more rare occurrence than the lynching of men over the same hundred year period covered in this text more than 1 000 white men were lynched while thousands of black men were murdered by mobs of particular importance in this examination is the role of race in lynching particularly the increase in the number of lynchings of black women as the century progressed details are provided when available in an attempt to shine a light on this form of deadly mob violence

the definitive account of the lynching of twenty three year old matthew williams in maryland the subsequent investigation and the legacy of modern day lynchings on december 4 1931 a mob of white men in salisbury maryland lynched and set ablaze a twenty three year old black man named matthew williams his gruesome murder was part of a wave of silent white terrorism in the wake of the stock market

crash of 1929 which exposed black laborers to white rage in response to economic anxieties for nearly a century the lynching of matthew williams has lived in the shadows of the more well known incidents of racial terror in the deep south haunting both the eastern shore and the state of maryland as a whole in the silent shore author charles l chavis jr draws on his discovery of previously unreleased investigative documents to meticulously reconstruct the full story of one of the last lynchings in maryland bringing the painful truth of anti black violence to light chavis breaks the silence that surrounded williams s death though maryland lacked the notoriety for racial violence of alabama or mississippi he writes it nonetheless was the site of at least 40 spectacle lynchings after the abolition of slavery in 1864 families of lynching victims rarely obtained any form of actual justice but williams s death would have a curious afterlife maryland s politically ambitious governor albert c ritchie would in an attempt to position himself as a viable challenger to fdr become one of the first governors in the united states to investigate the lynching death of a black person ritchie tasked patsy johnson a member of the pinkerton detective agency and a former prizefighter with going undercover in salisbury and infiltrating the mob that murdered williams johnson would eventually befriend a young local who admitted to participating in the lynching and who also named several local law enforcement officers as ringleaders despite this a grand jury after hearing 124 witness statements declined to indict the perpetrators but this denial of justice galvanized governor ritchie s interracial commission which would become one of the pioneering forces in the early civil rights movement in maryland complicating historical narratives associated with the history of lynching in the city of salisbury the silent shore explores the immediate and lingering effect of williams s death on the politics of racism in the united states the black community in salisbury the broader eastern shore the state of maryland and the legacy of modern day lynchings

in 1916 in front of a crowd of ten to fifteen thousand cheering spectators watched as seventeen year old jesse washington a retarded black boy was publicly tortured lynched and burned on the town square of waco texas he had been accused and convicted in a kangaroo court for the rape and murder of a white woman the city s mayor and police chief watched washington s torture and murder and did nothing nearby a professional photographer took pictures to sell as mementos of that day the stark story and gory pictures were soon printed in the crisis the monthly magazine of the fledgling naacp as part of that organization s campaign for antilynching legislation even in the vast bloodbath of lynchings that washed across the south and midwest during the late 1800s and early 1900s the waco lynching stood out the naacp assigned a young white woman elisabeth freeman to travel to waco to investigate and report back the evidence she gathered and gave to w e b du bois provided grist for the efforts of the naacp to raise national consciousness of the atrocities being committed and to raise funds to lobby antilynching legislation as well in the summer of 1916 three disparate forces a vibrant growing city bursting with optimism on the blackland prairie of central texas a young woman already tempered in the frontline battles for woman s suffrage and a very small organization of grimly determined progressives in new york city collided with each other

with consequences no one could have foreseen they were brought together irrevocably by the prolonged torture and public murder of jesse washington the atrocity that became known as the waco horror drawing on extensive research in the national files of the naacp local newspapers and archives and interviews with the descendants of participants in the events of that day patricia bernstein has reconstructed the details of not only the crime but also its aftermath she has charted the ways the story affected the development of the naacp and especially the eventual success of its antilynching campaign she searches for answers to the questions of how participating in such violence affected the lives of the mob leaders the city officials who stood by passively and the community that found itself capable of such abject behavior

nearly 5 000 black americans were lynched between 1890 and 1960 and assherrilyn ifill argues the effects of this racial trauma continue to resound while the lynchings were devastating the little known contemporaryconsequences such as the marginalization of political and economicdevelopment for blacks are equally pernicious ifill traces the lingering effects of two lynchings in maryland to illustrate how ubiquitous this history is and she issues a clarion call for the many american communities with histories of racial violence to be proactive in facing this legacy
